#### Adopt A Vet . . . To Tell Them Thanks

The members and offices of the Greater Michigan Mechanical Service Contractors in cooperation with our Ferris State University Chapter will work with the Greater Michigan Plumbing & Mechanical Contractors Association to make available to the National Guard families from the Big Rapids Armory, plumbing and mechanical contractors on whom they can



depend, while their loved ones are oversees.



As this is a new program, we are in the process of contacting members of our national organizations enlisting them as participants for the home areas of the Guard Families.

Other items we can assist on, from the standpoint of our Ferris State University MSCA Student Chapter Members, and the PMC are being considered. Our first request was helping someone who was unfamiliar with computers and was having problems.



Representatives from the Chapter were in Big Rapids when the Reservists shipped out in early February, including a much younger

contingent who drove up to attend the send off for the PMC, leaving Livingston County before 6:00 AM to be there to show their support.





### **Packets for Military Personnel**

The Association, along with our younger support teams, put together Christmas care packages for the solders in Iraq. The students went shopping, after taking the time to research the internet, for the items the soldiers needed most.

Packets, Christmas Cards and candy were packed and taken to the Howell Armory and sent to a division from the Livingston County area.

With hundreds of thousands of U.S. troops deployed around the world, actively engaged in Operation Iraqi Freedom and the fight against terrorism, the USO is

offering a way to send a reminder to the troops that they are appreciated and have not been forgotten.

Due to heightened security, individuals can no longer send letters and packages marked for delivery to 'Any Service Member'. Endorsed by the Department of Defense, the USO program "Operation USO Care Package", provides individuals with a way to touch the lives of our deployed troops around the world.

The USO is sending care packages that include requested items such as pre-paid worldwide phone cards, sunscreen, travel size toiletries, and messages from Americans who want to thank them for their service. As days turn into weeks and weeks into months, reminders from home are welcomed by the troops. #### **Boundless Playground**


What is the Boundless Playground at High Point? Imagine a place where people of all abilities can laugh, grow, learn, and play – together!

Ann Arbor is just one of 19 Michigan communities that received grants to build a fully integrated, universally accessible play environment. The Able to Play Project was launched with a lead gift from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. The PMC is a financial sponsoring organization, and is working to get volunteers for the build project.

Play is vital to a child's development! Boundless Playgrounds are designed to be fun,



rigorous and challenging places for youth of all ages.



The educational benefit of a Boundless Playground was evident after such a play area was built at the Baer School in Baltimore, Maryland. Students with severe disabilities experienced an increased rate in their developmental growthmore than double the growth they experienced prior to the playground being constructed.



2004 marked the 14<sup>th</sup> consecutive year that the Greater Michigan PMC/MSCA and UA 190 – Plumbers / Pipefitters / Service Technicians have provided services to the public through the HEAT's ON Project (Handicapped and Elderly Assistance to Our Neighbors). Over 100 volunteers from the PMC, UA 190 and local contractors and students worked to insure the welfare of citizens in both Washtenaw and Livingston Counties.
