# *New Welding Classes*

## **Tip Tig Wire Fed Welding Process**

This 20 hour course was specifically designed for UA Welding Instructors and focused on the evolution of Tip Tig welding in addition to providing detailed understanding on the GTQAW Hot Wire (HW) Feed Tip Tig welding process. The Tip Tig manual process allows for substantial increase in filler metal deposition while maintaining superior GTAW weld quality. The limitation of traditional GTAW has always been low productivity and Tip Tig has solved this limitation by joining HW GTAW with a linear oscillation of continuously fed wire. This course covered the safety, operation, technology and equipment set-up associated with this type of advanced welding systems. In addition, the course covered process variables, system control functions and weld parameter selection for a variety of materials.



## **Methods in Teaching Heavy Wall Pipe Welding**

This 20 hour course was specifically designed for UA Welding Instructors that will cover the challenges of welding heavy wall piping. The course focuses on the procedures and techniques using the gas tungsten arc welding (GTAW) and shielded metal arc welding (SMAW) processes. The piping industry is turning to the use of these materials more and more. This course provided Local Unions a means of preparing their members in developing the skills necessary to address industry's welding needs.



# Classrooms

## Adult Basic Life Support/First Aid

This course trained and /or certified the student instructor in conducting adult basic life support. This includes cardiopulmonary resuscitation, automated external defibrillation and related subjects such as initial care for angina, stroke and foreign body airway obstruction. The basic first aid portion includes procedures for emergency moving of the injured, wounds, bleeding, traumatic shock, fractures, burns and special emphasis on accidental electrical contact, eye injuries, allergic reactions, seizures, drug overdoses, temperature-related problems and many other job related emergencies. Upon successful completion of this course, the student instructor is able to teach and certify other UA members in this course. This program has been officially accepted by the U.S. Department of Labor—Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) as well as other federal and state agencies. This is the only first aid course developed specifically for the building trades industry.



## UA/MCAA Foreman Certification

This course is designed to develop current and potential foremen within the UA and MCAA into more effective leaders. It covers topics that are critical to the workplace such as: leadership functions, commitment, people skills, communications, teamwork and organization. Those taking the course were strongly urged to implement this Foremen Certification Program at the local union level.



## Designing Courses

In this course, the focus shifts from teaching individual classes to designing a whole course. They started with writing goals, and then moved to effective sequencing of course materials. They learned how to design an overall assessment plan for a course, including how to evaluate projects and other forms of assessment for evidence of learning.



## ***Methods in Teaching Pipe Trades Applied Drawing***

The course was designed to help UA Instructors develop and enhance their teaching skills in drawing interpretation. The class mainly focused on understanding the basics of plan and elevation drawings, as well as developing grading criteria and seceding time length for each assignment.



## ***Applied Metallurgy***



This course introduced and explained properties and characteristics of metals commonly used in the pipe trades. Students learned the nature of ferrous and non-ferrous metals, both in their raw and their manufactured forms. There was an emphasis on the physical and mechanical properties of common metals, and the processes used to create desired changes.



## ***Customer Service Skills***



The purpose of the course provided UA instructors with the skills necessary to teach apprentices how to deal with internal and external customers. At the end of the course, instructors were able to create lessons on improving interdependence with customers, gaining new customers, and retaining existing customers. The class covered how to use classroom materials such as the MSCA Customer Service Student Workbook and Leaders Guide, the Customer Service for the Commercial Service Technician Video Series, and the Customer Service for the Residential Service Technician Video Series. Additionally, UA instructors learned how to facilitate a customer service lab. During the course, instructors were given opportunities to practice skills from the curriculum. At the conclusion of the class, the UA Instructor was able to successfully implement a customer service program in their own local.

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## ***Authorized Testing Representative (ATR)***

The course was designed to provide participants with an understanding of the fundamentals of the UA Welder Certification Program. Participants were able to perform the duties and responsibilities of an Authorized Testing Representative (ATR) as defined in the program, from managing administrative functions to performing visual inspections of welded coupons to determine their acceptability in accordance with the UA Quality System and adopted codes.


